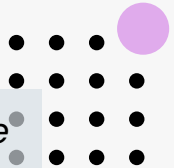

Formulaic Language

“strings of letters, words, sounds [...], contiguous or non-contiguous, of any length, size, frequency, degree of compositionality, literality/figurativeness, abstractness and complexity, [...] that necessarily enjoy a degree of conventionality or familiarity among (typical) speakers of a language community or group, and that hold a strong relationship in communicating meaning.” Siyanova-Chanturia & Pellicer-Sanchez (2019:5)

cannot be derived from
the meaning of its
component words

Formulaic Sequences

Conventionalised strings of more than two words which frequently fulfill specific communicative functions and form a unit of meaning - Wray (2002)

- Overlap with and inclusion of other categories like 'prepositional verbs' or 'idioms'
- different theoretical backgrounds
- The name they are given is irrelevant.
- IMPORTANT!!! their recurrence in the language as phrases sharing characteristics in the definition and their potential to convey meaning

Which wordstrings could qualify as FSs?

A. Count on me (Mars, 2010)

- 1 If you ever find yourself (stuck in the middle of the sea)
- 2 I'll sail the world to find you
- 3 If you ever find yourself lost in the dark and you can't see
- 4 I'll be the light to guide you
- 5 We find out what we're made of
- 6 When we are called to help our friends in need



B. Remember Me (Iñigo Pascual, 2017)

- 1 Remember me
- 2 Though I have to say goodbye
- 3 Remember me
- 4 Don't let it make you cry
- 5 For even if I'm far away I hold you in my heart
- 6 I sing a secret song to you each night we are
apart

C. You are not alone (Joe and Jake, 2016)

- 1 Heartbeat, when you're not around it's beating slow
- 2 And it's something that I've never known, oh whoa
- 3 I'll be, I'll be the answer you've been waiting for
- 4 I'll be the truth that you've been looking for, oh whoa
- 5 You're not alone, we're in this together
- 6 All that you want is right here forever
- 7 And they don't need to know, oh oh oh
- 8 And they don't need to know

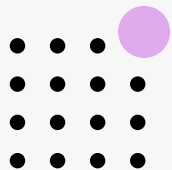

Unit of meaning with a communicative purpose :
ENTRY IN A MONOLINGUAL DICTIONARY

FREQUENCY – COCA

YOUGLISH

FSs from “Count on me” (Mars, 2010)

“Find yourself (stuck in the middle of the sea)” appears in the Cambridge Dictionary online as follows:

Find yourself

To realize that you are in a particular situation or place, or doing a particular thing, when you did not intend to:

Examples:

*He'll **find himself** with no friends at all if he carries on behaving this way.*

*We fell asleep on the train and woke up to **find ourselves** in Calais.*

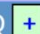

Examples: "find yourself"

Number of occurrences: **10.008**

Prosodic characteristics:

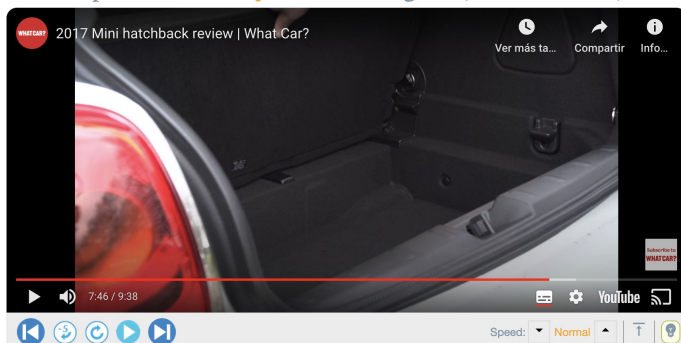
- 1 Intonation Phrase that ends in "yourself"
- Pause only after "yourself"
- Fixed accentuation pattern

/... faɪnd jɔːself /

- Coalescence in some cases (phonological process)

/ faɪndʒɔːself /

How to pronounce **find yourself** in English (15 out of 9993):



loading lip, when putting items in. If you do
find yourself in need of more space, then

you **find yourself** in survival mode,

Number Four: You **find yourself** feeling guilty
often.

For example: you might **find yourself**
procrastinating.

So next time you **find yourself** in an
escalating argument,

Examples: “find yourself stuck”

Number of occurrences: **72**

Prosodic characteristics:

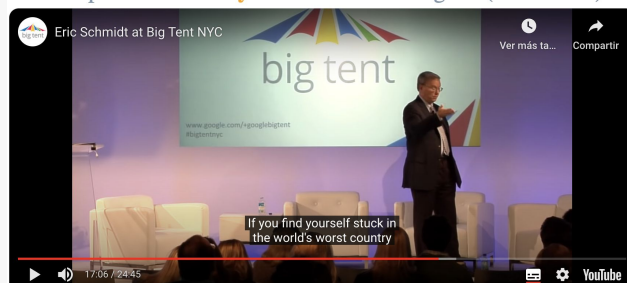
- 1 Intonation Phrase that ends after the ADJ “stuck”
- Fixed accentuation pattern

/... faɪnd jɔːself stʌk/

- Coalescence in some cases
(phonological process)

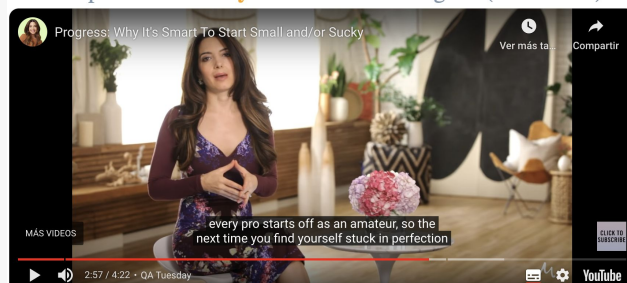

How to pronounce **find yourself stuck** in English (1 out of 72):



If you **find** **yourself** **stuck** in the world's worst country

How to pronounce **find yourself stuck** in English (2 out of 72):



every pro starts off as an amateur, so the next time you **find** **yourself** **stuck** in perfection

“FIND YOURSELF ADJ”



Dictionary entry:

- you did not intend to be in that situation in the first place,



A quick search in COCA for ‘find yourself ADJ’ -

- 219 occurrences – 85% adjectives with
*a **NEGATIVE** connotation such as alone, afraid, etc.*
- (ADJ) + Prepositional phrase: ‘in the...’

Meaning: IF not “NEGATIVE”, at least UNEXPECTED

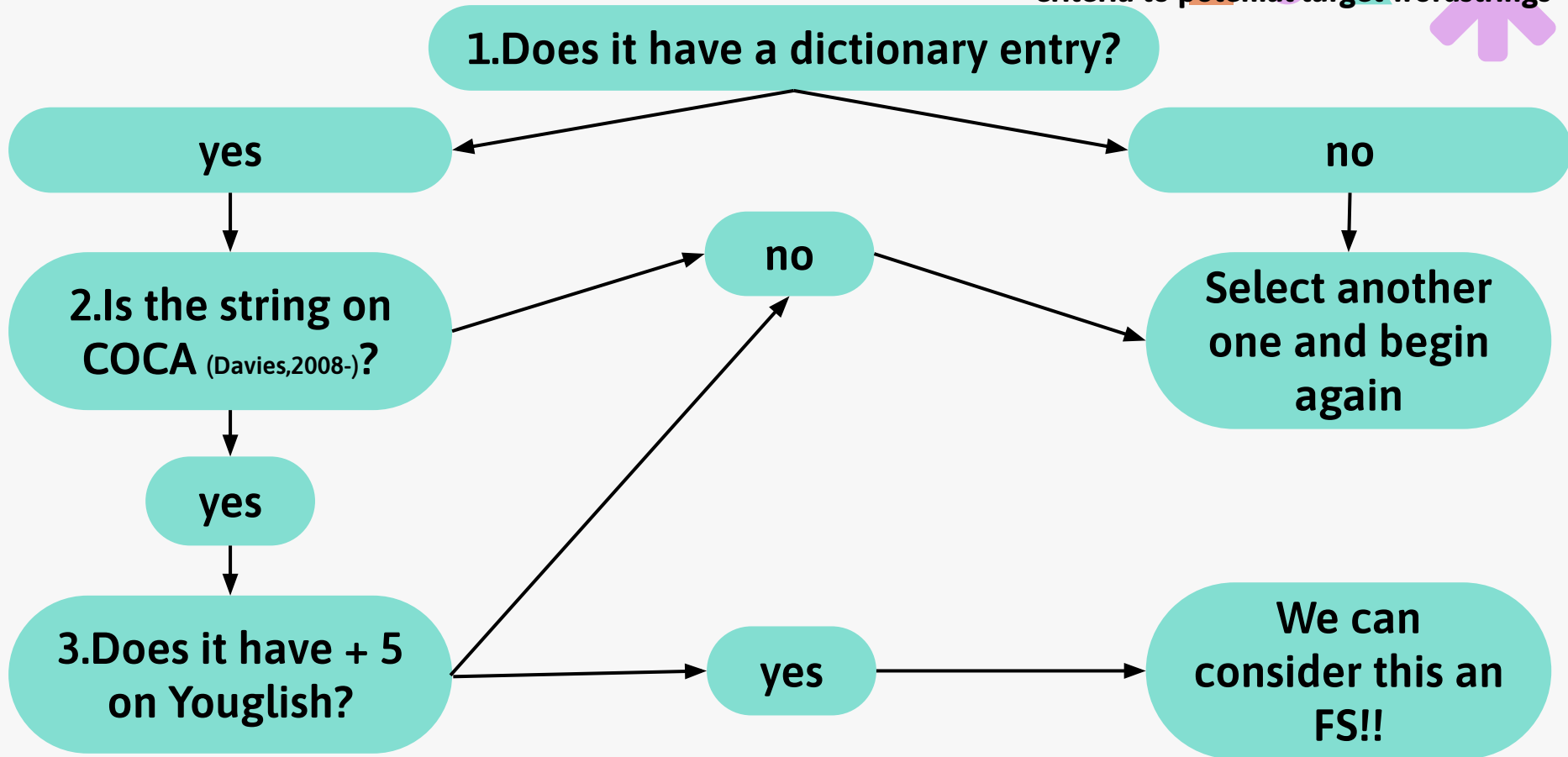


Searches in YOUglish

TEACHABILITY: PRODUCTIVE (combined with both adjectives and Prep. phrases)

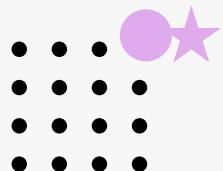


Is this an FS worth teaching?

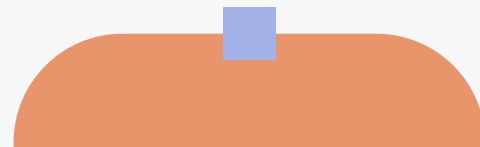
- ★ Does it appear in my coursebook?
 - Which FSs? Which areas of formulaic language are missing?
 - **How are they presented? Practised?**

★ Are there other possible FSs of interest in CB texts?

- **Unfocused?**
- **productive?(frequency?)**
- **Suitable to learners' level?**



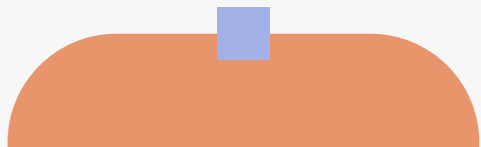
★ Do I need to complement the CB's approach?



Conclusion



When in doubt, to establish whether your selected wordstring is an FS:

- Check the dictionary to see if it appears as a separate entry. This will inform you about its status as a **unit of meaning**. And if the string has a meaning that cannot be derived from the combination of its parts (**non-compositionality**).
 - Check its **frequency** on corpora and the web, considering possible variations as regards morphology.
 - Check Youglish.com to see if there are more than 5 instances and listen to some to check prosodic features and observe **regularities** in pronunciation (degree of phonological fixedness).
 - Check if the wordstring is focused on in your textbooks and/or if they appear in texts you are working with.
 - Check if it's appropriate for sts' proficiency level, learners' age, hours allocated to the course and institutional context.
